Agency Overview

Incorporated in 1975 as a 501 (c) (3) non-profit, The Center for Victims of Violence and Crime (CVVC) is one of the oldest and largest comprehensive crime victim assistance agencies in the region. CVVC serves all of Allegheny County, Pennsylvania with the following mission:

“Helping individuals, families and communities survive the trauma of violence and crime by offering victim advocacy services, crisis intervention, counseling and community education programs that address the causes and impacts of violence.”

CVVC holds the unique status of being both a rape crisis center as well as a comprehensive victim assistance center. Comprehensive denotes two unique aspects of CVVC:

- We are the only victim service agency in the County that services victims of all forms of crime and violence including sexual assault, aggravated and simple assault, homicide, child abuse, elder abuse, robbery, burglary, and DUIs.
- We offer an extensive range of crime victim assistance services which includes crisis intervention, counseling and advocacy services, and community education and outreach programs that raise awareness of the impact of violence, promote victim's rights and services, and encourage violence-free lifestyles.

For over 30 years, the agency's services and programs have been based on three fundamental beliefs:

- early intervention and outreach to victims of crime and violence supports personal recovery and healing processes;
- unattended and unresolved trauma, grief, and loss caused by violence negatively impacts a person's health and worldview, inhibits coping skills, and reduces personal options which increase the likelihood of that person's exposure to victimization and violence;
- violence must be viewed as a public health issue that requires further education of the public regarding intervention and prevention strategies.

Based on these core beliefs, CVVC offers critical services to victims and witnesses of crime and provides community education and outreach programming to all citizens of Allegheny County. ➔

Direct Service Highlights

- CVVC offers a full continuum of victim assistance services. Through all of its programs, CVVC provides crisis intervention and supportive counseling to those impacted by violence and crime.
- In Allegheny County, CVVC is the primary provider of services to victims mandated by the Pennsylvania Victim's Bill of Rights.
- CVVC is the only agency in the County that works with survivors of homicide.
- CVVC is the County's primary victim service agency that provides services to child victims of sexual assault and abuse from the initial investigation (forensic evaluation) through courtroom testimonies.
- CVVC is the County's primary filer of Victims Compensation claims and one of the highest filers in Pennsylvania. Our Victim Compensation Department is electronically tied to Harrisburg for efficient, rapid claim filing.
- By providing the following variety of services, CVVC helps individuals and families recover:

24-Hour Helpline 412-392-8582

CVVC's 24-Hour Helpline offers around-the-clock assistance and information by caring, knowledgeable professionals who can provide immediate help, emotional support, safety planning, and guidance. Professional staff also provides in-person emergency response to hospitals, police stations, and communities.

Advocacy

CVVC offers information about the criminal and juvenile justice systems, medical and social service systems, Victim's Rights and financial compensation to name a few. Working within systems can be difficult and confusing. CVVC is there to help and support victims, protect their rights and help them get the services they need.

Court Orientation and Accompaniment

Court orientation and accompaniment is designed to give victims and witnesses someone to answer their questions, address their fears and walk them through the court process. CVVC attends court proceedings to provide support and information, and help victims and witnesses through the experience.

Medical Advocacy and Accompaniment

CVVC is available to respond to hospitals as support persons for the victim and their loved ones throughout their experience. CVVC provides information about various medical and legal procedures and assesses the victim's future needs for services.

Victim Compensation

The Pennsylvania Victims Compensation Assistance Program helps lessen the economic hardship that often affects crime victims by reimbursing certain expenses. CVVC helps clients assess their eligibility and assists in filing claims with the state.

Therapy

After a thorough assessment of needs, CVVC provides individual, family, and group therapy, facilitates ongoing support groups and links clients with appropriate treatment resources available in the community.

Offender Release Notification

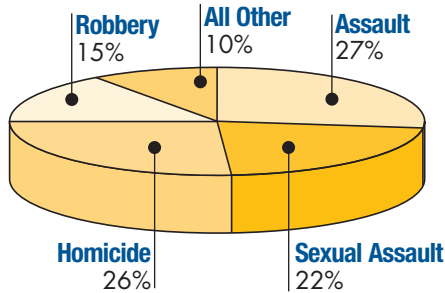
Release Notification is a right provided to eligible crime victims under Pennsylvania law. Eligible victims have the right to be notified of the transfer or release of an offender if they register for notification. CVVC administers this program on behalf of the Allegheny County Jail and assists victims with registering for notification services for state and federal facilities. ➔

Clients Reported:

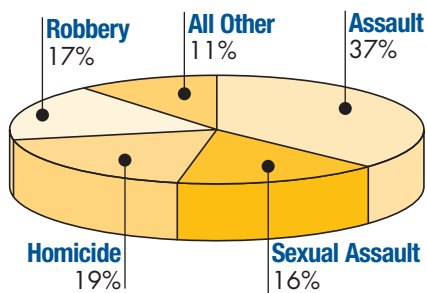
- 98% of clients who responded to agency surveys reported they would recommend our agency to others in need.

Services by Crime Type

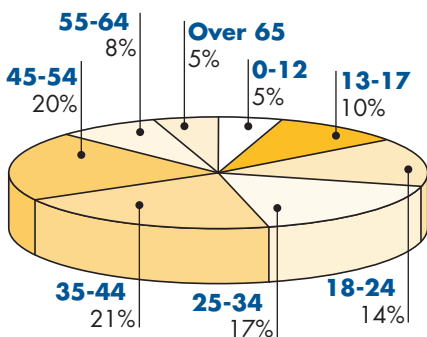
Based on Number of Service Hours



Based on Number of Clients



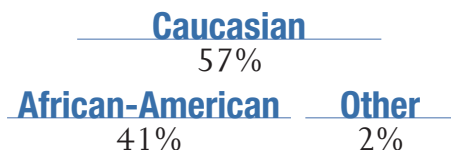
Age of Clients Served

Community Education / Outreach and Professional Training Highlights

CVVC provides vital information, tools, and resources to facilitate violence prevention and public and personal safety – increasing awareness about victimization and the impacts of crime. Through innovative education and outreach programs, CVVC empowers individuals, families, and communities with knowledge to help decrease risk factors and promote violence-free lives. CVVC also offers extensive training to allied professionals and the community on a variety of topics related to victim assistance, victims’ rights, and prevention strategies.

■ In fiscal year 2005-2006, CVVC provided approximately 30,000 citizens with close to 2,000 training and educational programs.

■ 63% of people trained were allied professionals. Program audiences and settings included: law enforcement, prosecutors, medical personnel, human service providers, schools and universities, senior groups, juvenile offender providers and programs, faith-based organizations, community groups, businesses, and others.

■ 66% of people receiving prevention and education programs were youth under age 18.

■ Topics included: Impacts of Crime and Violence including trauma reactions, Responding to Victims to Facilitate Help and Healing, Victim Awareness/Sensitivity, Victims’ Rights, and a thorough evidenced-based Violence Prevention Curriculum that focuses on skill building to reduce risk and prevalence of violence.

DRUMA: Developing Respect and Unity through Music and Arts – developed by our Community Education and Outreach Department, is an evidence-based curriculum which incorporates music and art and often additional African-centered violence prevention strategies.

Training and Prevention & Education Program Participants Reported:

- 96% of people who responded to surveys reported they learned useful skills or information during the programs.
- 95% felt there was overall value in what they learned.

Educational Symposiums

■ **Black and Blue:** In June 2004, CVVC launched its first seminar series entitled “Black and Blue: Violence in the Lives of Black Women.”

- The goals of the seminar series are:
 - To raise awareness of violence in the lives of this underserved population;
 - To share strategies for healing, and;
 - To communicate to social service agencies and the public various ways to overcome barriers to Black women receiving services.

Community Education / Outreach and Professional Training Highlights

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- The third seminar in the series – held in July 2005 had over 320 attendees. The evaluations of all three seminars confirmed their success and tremendous impact. Black and Blue seminars received support from community agencies and foundations crossing public and private sectors.
- CVVC plans to host an annual conference/seminar to highlight violence as a major public health issue.

- 93% of attendees from the third seminar who completed evaluation surveys want to attend another seminar hosted by CVVC.
- 92% of attendees from the third seminar who completed evaluation surveys reported that the seminar gave them more knowledge about the impact of violence.

Community Crisis Response and Intervention

When violence directly or indirectly touches a community, school, or workplace in Allegheny County, CVVC has the capacity to send in a team of crisis responders. Through early intervention and outreach, the effects of trauma that can seriously affect an individual, family or entire community can be lessened. In fiscal year 2005-2006, CVVC provided 111 community crisis response interventions to 702 individuals. ➔

As a result, CVVC is part of a vast referral network of service providers and community groups working collaboratively to provide victims with the utmost quality of care without duplicating services.

■ CVVC is the only agency with the capacity to provide community crisis response to an incident of violence in Allegheny County. We are the only agency in the region that has 94% of direct service staff trained as National Organization for Victim Assistance (NOVA) crisis responders. In addition, we have a certified, national NOVA trainer on staff.

■ CVVC has been on the ground floor of a State-wide Outcomes-Based Evaluation Tools Collaboration that is currently being integrated throughout the state. ➔
